

GIBBERELLIC ACID (aka gib): Part of the fun of growing camellias


Claudette Shelfer has brought gib back from the ACS meeting in Gulfport. If you would like some, she will have it at our December meeting or call Oscar Schank if you want it earlier. Instructions are included, and it is easier than it used to be. Using gib now on your camellias will result in larger, showier blooms for our show.





DECEMBER TIPS FOR THE CAMELLIA GARDNER By Dennis Bilyeu

- 1 This is a very good time to spray dormant oil for scale problems on your camellias. Add the Nickel fertilizer-if you have it-and it will jump start the growth of your camellia next spring. If you didn't get any from Mark Crawford, use any kind of soluble fertilizer. Also, add a little (1 tbls/gal) insecticide such as Malathion to help kill the scale insects. If you have a mite problem use a mitescide instead of the insecticide. I found a good miteiscide at Henderson Feed Store that worked well for me.
- 2 Also this is a great time to start gibbing blooms for our January camellia show. Start with 30 to 40 buds this week, then come back and gib more buds each week up to about three weeks before Show time. Gibbing will not only control the time your flowers mature, but will also result in larger, showier blooms.
- If you bought camellia plants recently, there are two op-3 tions you need to consider. Take the plant out of the pot and take a look at the root system. If there are lots of roots and the plant looks almost root bound, it is ready to put in the ground. This time of year is a great time to be planting camellias-check our website for a recommended procedure. If you don't see a lot of roots, repot the plant. Leaving the plant in the pine bark soil will require frequent fertilizing and daily watering, plus the root system will not develop in a way that sustains the plant once in the ground. To remedy this common problem from nursery grown Camellias, carefully remove the pine bark from around the roots (a gentle water spray works well) and repot using a good potting mix, perhaps a camellia-azalea mix, to encourage good root growth. Don't plan on planting in the ground for about a year.

Remembering the Man Who Loved Camellias

Gregory Earl (Greg) Davis, born in Austin, TX on July 23, 1930, died October 21, 2012 in Houston TX after a brief battle with cancer. He was the only son of Chesley Earl and Evelyn Tigner Davis.

Raised in Huntsville, Greg excelled in various athletics, was captain/quarterback for the Huntsville Hornets; an honor student, he served as Sr Class President and Valedictorian. He became an Eagle Scout.

Greg received his BS in Chemical Engineering from Rice Institute in 1952. After graduation, Greg became a loyal supporter of Rice, serving many years as class recorder for the Owlmanac, enjoyed the Shepard School of Music, Rice Historical Society and ROMEOs.

After college, Greg entered into the petrochemical industry, beginning with Celanese, TX Butadiene, and lastly enjoyed 31 year of service with Exxon Mobile, retiring in 1992. After retirement, Greg was an active member of the West Houston Exxon Retirees Club.

Moving the family to Houston in 1968, Greg was introduced to camellias and became an avid camellia hobbyist. Over the years he served in various capacities for the Houston and American societies as well as 8 years as President of the International Camellia Society.

Joining St Luke's Methodist Church in 1970, Greg was a member of the Hines-Baker Bible class, served with the Ushers & Life Celebration Guild and was a devoted parishioner.

Greg had a lifelong interest in photography, contributing photos to the Rice Owlmanac, Exxon, and various camellia journals. He was never without a camera! An avid reader, he loved all books on TX, humor, mysteries and historical novels.

Greg is survived by his wife of 59 years, Rosamay Lindsey Davis; son Greg Davis and wife Cindy (Tuttle, OK), daughter Ann C Davis (Austin, TX), son M Lindsey Davis and wife Cynthia Rohan (Castle Pines, CO), grandson Kevin Davis and granddaughter Katie Davis; sisters Mrs. Vernon (Carolyn) Miles of Ft. Walton Beach, FL, and Mr. & Mrs. Mohamed (Donna) Mortada from Dallas, TX, beloved nieces & nephew and an irritating assortment of 'grand-dogs'. Witty and charming, Greg was a friend to all and loved by many. He will be truly missed.

A private interment was held Thursday in Lovelady, TX, with a memorial service and reception to celebrate Greg's life at 1pm on Friday, Oct 26, at St. Luke's Methodist Church, 3471 Westheimer, Houston, TX 77027. Greg was always so helpful and enjoyed sharing his knowledge and expertise. I also got a kick of the stories he could tell - I am sure that anyone who went with him on one of his many trips had a great time, because Greg could always find something interesting to enjoy.

BOARD MEETING MINUTES FOR COUSHATTA CAMELLIA SOCIETY OF CONROE, TEXAS

Meeting called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Oscar Schank, Acting President.

The first topic of discussion was the January Camellia show and whether we needed more camellias. The plan is to ask for camellias out of Jeff Odum's stock if needed. We have a few camellias left after the fall plant sale, but will need at least 50-75 for show. 100 plants were sold last year, but this year the show will be one day instead of two. Jenny Marcotte will be organizing clerks for the January show.

The second topic discussed was that President Oscar Schank has signed Coushatta Camellia Society to participate again at Conroe's April Master Gardeners' plant sale. 66-68 plants were sold at the Master Gardener plant sale for \$35.00 each. The Master Gardeners were very pleased with our participation at their sale, and CCS members also felt it was a good experience. Oscar stated that we will not be participating in the Mercer March Mart this year. There is a new director at Mercer, who has not honored past agreements that were made with CCS.

December 4th dinner meeting was next on agenda. Plan is for 3 spiral hams and the committee will be calling members for the side dishes they plan to bring. Possible performers are being discussed as well. Edie Tong has a contact that she will pursue.

Treasurer Claudette Shelfer presented the Financial report, showing \$14,480.58 currently in the bank.

Corrections for member listings are being made for members to add to their directory. This information will be published in the newsletter.

Maxine Schank suggested that our Christmas meeting include a donation to the community, in the spirit of Christmas. A toy drive for Christmas was discussed and the plan is to join the First Christian Church's toy drive. Oscar Schank to call church office and see if this would be an option. If so, members may bring unwrapped gifts to the December meeting. Judy Weidner will bring a plumeria for one of the door prizes. We will need 2 door prizes.

Handouts for Coushatta Camellia Society were discussed, to be handed out to new members and prospective members. The possibility of visiting nursing homes and other places to share knowledge of camellias with the community was also discussed.

Donation of tables to First Christian Church was discussed and President Oscar Schank will contact church regarding progress on this. The Church will purchase the tables, since they can do so without being required to pay sales tax, and CCS will reimburse them.
