# **TEXAS CAMELLIA SHOW**

Coushatta Camellia Society is again participating with the Texas Camellia Show sponsors. The show will be held in Huntsville, Texas on Saturday, February 26, 2011, in a new (to us) location. Activities for set up will be kicked off on Friday, the 25<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 pm at the Walker Education Center. It is located on 19<sup>th</sup> street at the western edge of the Sam Houston Museum property.

Directions: From I-45 South, take exit # 115 and proceed on the feeder road to the intersection of 19<sup>th</sup> street and then turn right. Proceed on 19<sup>th</sup> street about ½ mile to the Walker Education Center brick building on the left. Enter the building through the main entrance for the show.

From I-45 North, take exit #115 and proceed on the feeder road to the next overpass, turn left after a horseshoe turn and go over the overpass, and then turn left on the feeder road and proceed to 19<sup>th</sup> street. Again, turn right and proceed about ½ mile to the Walker Education Center building located on 19<sup>th</sup> street. From the Courthouse, proceed on Sam Houston Avenue, to 19<sup>th</sup> street, turn right (only direction possible) and proceed several blocks to the Center.

Saturday morning, the door will be opened at 7:00 am for exhibitors to begin arranging blooms. Judging will begin about 10:30 am, and lunch will be about 12:00 noon. Public viewing will begin at 1:00 pm. Camellia plants will be available for sale to the general public.

A successful show depends on volunteers and participants. Without both, the Show just would not be possible. # **MERCER MARCH MART 2011**

Coushatta Camellia Society will participate again in Mercer March Mart, bringing 300 Camellias to the sale for \$35 each. A portion of proceeds goes to Mercer, and CCS bears the cost of plants and shipping from a Mississippi Nursery, delivered directly to Mercer. CCS will provide volunteers to staff camellia tables and sell Camellia plants at the March Mart. Each plant will have a CCS website tag so purchasers can get information on planting & care of their plants, or contact us for information or membership.

Ten thousand people visit March Mart each year, so we will need to have a large number of volunteers to help with plant sales March 23 - 26. The sale should net a significant profit for our society and introduce camellias and CCS to many new people. Last year (our first at Mercer) we sold nearly all our 300 plants and the sale became the single best fund raiser for the club. We hope to do as well and possibly better this year.

Tommy Weeks is our Mercer Coordinator this year and he will get much help from our plant sales group of Dick Eidem and Randy McDaniel. We will need to have our booth and plants set up and ready for sale by Noon Wednesday, March 23rd. This afternoon is reserved for volunteers working at the plant sale so they can do some shopping. If you are a regular member of the Mercer Society you will get the opportunity to shop on Thursday afternoon. VIP members (donate over \$100) get to shop exclusively on Thursday morning and then Thursday afternoon with the regular members. The general public shops on Friday and Saturday. Mercer Society members also have special check out privileges and areas to store their plants while they are shopping, along with discount coupons. The price of Mercer membership is generally considered well worth the benefits received during March Mart.

Last year Tommy and I cut Camellia blooms from our gardens and brought them to Mercer for one of their educational programs. We set the blooms up in the lobby of the visitor center and when the class took breaks they were oohing and aaahing at our beautiful blooms. I believe many of these same people returned to March Mart to buy our Camellia plants based on the blooms they saw at this event. We hope to do something similar this year.

The Mercer people are still very excited about our new relationship and are looking for ways to expand our involvement in Mercer activities. I believe this continues to be a great opportunity for CCS to spread the word about Camellias to a much wider audience. For your information Mabel was elected Vice President of the Mercer Society and I was elected to the Board of Directors.

## FEBRUARY TIPS FOR THE CAMELLIA GARDENER

## **PLANTING**

Continue planting potted plants that have root development to the outer edge of the pot. Do not plant or re-pot plants that had their roots disturbed in the last three months as when re-potting plants. February is also a good month to transplant large plants from one location to another. For more details on recommended techniques for transplanting large plants contact the author.

#### **FERTILIZE**

Now is a good time to apply a little fertilizer to your Camellias. Mrs. Henderson (Henderson Feed and Supply) has some 3 month Osmocote - an excellent slow release fertilizer for camellias and azaleas. If you want to use cottonseed meal, this season is the best time, at these recommended concentrations: (note: check ingredients to make sure your cottenseed meal does <u>not</u> contain salt!)

- -For small to large container plants use 1 to 2 tablespoons
- -For small to large in-ground plants use 2 to 4 tablespoons
- -For all planted/transplanted plants where you used filler soil with a high organic content, use 4 to 5 tablespoons t this time of year you should only use slow release or low nitroger

At this time of year you should only use slow release or low nitrogen fertilizer. Tommy Weeks has a source of low nitrogen fertilizer from Grow Power that works very well this time of year. Contact Tommy directly to acquire some of this excellent fertilizer.

#### **PRUNING**

After your Camellia has finished blooming and before it starts putting on new growth is an excellent time to prune your plants. Generally pruning is done to create a desired shape or to remove internal branching that blocks light from the center of the plant. For more information on pruning contact our acknowledged club expert in this area, Dick Eidem.

## **SPRAYING**

After heavy pruning, spray or apply a paste fungicide to cut ends to prevent die back. An excellent fungicide is one tablespoon each of Captan and Cleary 3336 in a gallon of water or mix just enough water to make a paste a brush this mixture on the cut wounds. Also, check for spider mites and scale and spray for these if necessary. Use oil emulsion to treat both of these problems and add the insec-

ticide Kelthane to the mix. Kelthane has been difficult to purchase lately and I am currently trying to find a good replacement treatment for spider mites. E.B. Smith has used a systemic insecticide from Henderson Feed Store that he says works great for both scale and spider mites. Personally I will be getting some of this systemic insecticide very soon. Milton Surles says Neem oil works on spider mites but other members doubt it is very effective. Also, I have been able to get Ms. Henderson to obtain a limited supply of the die-back fungicide Cleary 3336 at our local Henderson Feed store. I believe she is currently sold out of this product but if you ask her I believe she can get more in about a week. I know Cherokee Caddell has a supply of this Cleary product and is willing to share; So, if you need to get some quickly call Cherokee.

## **PROPAGATION**

February is the ideal month to do grafting. I have posted a grafting procedure on our web site and am available for advice. This is the best technique for generating a new large plant of a special variety you would like to have. A well cared for graft can grow from a 4 inch scion to 3 feet tall or more in one year. My procedure lists all the materials needed to do grafting but you need to start with a desired scion and good root stock (Sasanqua is generally preferred). I have lots of plants in my yard that would be good sources for scions and a limited supply of good root stock if anyone wants some.

#### **PETAL BLIGHT**

I received a note from Tom LeRoy on the use of corn meal to treat petal blight and he says corn meal has not been very effective in our area in the past and that the best method of preventing petal blight is still to pick up your blooms. Also, all Henderson has available is corn gluten and Tom does not know if that is the same as corn meal or if it is effective against petal blight. The brute force way to handle petal blight is the way E. B. Smith does it and that is to remove all of the organic material from under your Camellia plants and dispose of it. It is a good idea to spray the bare ground under your Camellias with a broad spectrum fungicide that lists petal blight as a fungi it controls, before adding more organic material around your Camellias. This brute force method has served E. B. well for many years.
