TEXAS CAMELLIA SHOW

Coushatta Camellia Society is again participating with the Texas Camellia Show sponsors. The show will be held in Huntsville, Texas on Saturday, February 26, 2011, in a new (to us) location. Activities for set up will be kicked off on Friday, the 25th at 2:00 pm at the Walker Education Center. It is located on 19th street at the western edge of the Sam Houston Museum property.

Directions: From I-45 South, take exit # 115 and proceed on the feeder road to the intersection of 19^{th} street and then turn right. Proceed on 19^{th} street about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile to the Walker Education Center brick building on the left. Enter the building through the main entrance for the show.

From I-45 North, take exit # 115 and proceed on the feeder road to the next overpass, turn left after a horseshoe turn and go over the overpass, and then turn left on the feeder road and proceed to 19th street. Again, turn right and proceed about ½ mile to the Walker Education Center building located on 19th street. From the Courthouse, proceed on Sam Houston Avenue, to 19th street, turn right (only direction possible) and proceed several blocks to the Center.

Saturday morning, the door will be opened at 7:00 am for exhibitors to begin arranging blooms. Judging will begin about 10:30 am, and lunch will be about 12:00 noon. Public viewing will begin at 1:00 pm. Camellia plants will be available for sale to the general public.

March Tips for the Camellia Gardener

Planting

This is the last month before next fall that I recommend planting Camellias in the ground. If you elect to plant in March it is very important that you water this plant at least twice a week (three times a week if you have sandy soil) through the summer months and well into the cooler fall months. Plants put in the ground in the optimal planting months of October, November and December should continue to be watered once a week through the summer months.

Fertilizing

Repeat February recommended use of cottonseed meal and add:

· An equal volume of 8-8-8 commercial fertilizer, and

• A small amount (about 20% of the cotton seed meal volume) of wood ash (let me know if you need some)

For those who prefer avoiding commercial fertilizers, application of a compost tea every two or three weeks is a great alternative. Google 'compost tea' on the Internet for recipes and instructions for making your own compost tea, or purchase at Lowes.

Pruning

See the February recommendation. If your growth buds are starting to push (are showing the light green color of new growth) this will be the last good time for pruning your plant this year.

Spraying

See the February recommendations. If you are planning to bring blooms to the Huntsville Show, delay spraying your plants until after the Show. Some of the recommended chemicals can burn or discolor your blooms. The exception to this recommendation of delaying your spraying is the case of having an open wound where die-back fungus could enter your plant and eventually kill it. An open wound can be caused by many things, some of which are: leaf drop, which is when your plant naturally drops its leaves and it creates a open wound that allows die back to enter; scuffs or scratches caused by tools, falling limbs, etc.; and pruning. Leaf drop is probably the single

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P.O. Box 1655 Conroe, TX 77305 largest cause of die-back infection and one that is most often overlooked by the Camellia Gardener. Camellias typically start dropping leaves just before growing season, which is now, so be watching for it and take the preventive action recommended in the February Newsletter.

Propagation

See the February recommendation on grafting. Grafting can be done through the month of March, but this is the last good month of the year I recommend grafting. Check those air layers that are still on the mother plants and if not ready to cut, resoak the sphagnum moss with the recommended root activator and water solution. Then re-wrap the air layer with cellophane and aluminum foil. If ready to cut (has sufficient root development), cut and soak in a root activator solution for at least two days before potting. After potting, spray foliage and soil with compost tea (see fertilizer comments). Identify blooms on plants you would like to propagate by tying a piece of surveyor tape on the branch. These will be branches you will want to air layer in April to clone that bloom into a new plant.

Mulching

March is a good month to remove old mulch (which likely contains old blooms or parts of blooms that are infected with petal blight) and dispose of it. Burying this mulch under at least 3" of soil is a good method of disposal. Add new mulch around your plants. The best mulch is pine straw. Not quite as good is pine bark mulch and less desirable is oak leaf mulch. Any kind of wood or leaf mulch is better than no mulch at all. I recommend waiting until your plants have finished blooming before replacing the mulch. Do your mulching before the fertilizing and be sure to water the fertilizer and mulch thoroughly. This sequence helps jump start the decomposition of the mulch into nutrients for your plants. The compost tea fertilizer works very well here because it also contains all the good bacteria needed for this decomposition process.
